



# Agri-Business Facility for Africa (ABF)

## Joint Action with EU-INTPA: Business Support Facility for Resilient Agricultural Value Chains

### General context

Micro, small and medium-sized enterprises (MSMEs) dominate agriculture in Africa, the Caribbean, and the Pacific (ACP countries). MSMEs therefore feed majority of the urban population and supply valuable raw materials for local and international industry. Women play a decisive role in this area, but have only limited access to land, technological inputs, information, training, or labour rights.

Agriculture is also severely affected by climate change. This means it is important to adapt agricultural practices and improve climate protection and resilience.

The Agri-Business Facility for Africa (ABF) project improves rural development and agriculture and strengthens the broad impact of online and face-to-face agricultural training and investments in climate-resilient value chains in member states of the Organisation of African, Caribbean and Pacific States (OACPS).

## The approach and activities

The project is commissioned by the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) and co-funded by the European Union Directorate-General for International Partnerships (EU INTPA) under the Samoa Agreement with the OACPS. The project aims to improve the broad impact of private and public agricultural support measures and institutions for MSMEs which enables those responsible along agricultural value chains (VCs) to invest in climate-resilient practices and VCs. Under the co-financing, ABF is focusing on the VCs maize, livestock (cattle, sheep, goat) and cocoa. All in all, ABF is implementing activities in the following three areas:

### 1. Skills for agribusiness

The project scales successful training approaches and instruments, especially for climate-resilient agricultural entrepreneurship. To achieve this, it is expanding the Agribusiness e-Academy's online training offer and providing advice on face-to-face training approaches. It also uses blended learning, a mixture of face-to-face and online learning formats, and has founded an association for master trainers and trainers.

### 2. Matching Grant Fund

As part of a competitive Matching Grant Fund, ABF promotes ideas that improve the cocoa, maize, and livestock value chains. The fund promotes excellence, ownership, and competitiveness. It also mobilises additional funds for the implementation of the multi-actor partnerships.

### 3. Public dialogue and South-South exchange

The project supports South-South exchange and cooperation: events such as expert talks, exchange formats and conferences assist in sharing experiences and best practices. The project also promotes regional and nationwide public-private dialogue in order to overcome challenges in value chains.

## Achievements

- ABF's advised partners trained more than 1.93 million smallholder farmers in Farmer Business School, around 3,000 cooperatives in Cooperative Business School and more than 69,500 processors in Processor Business School with 35%, 34% and 92% being women respectively.
- These smallholder farmers have gained invaluable insights to navigate challenges and seize opportunities within their value chains and boosting income through diversified production.
- ABF's Agribusiness e-Academy on atingi.org was officially launched in May 2022 and already issued around 9,000 certificates to successful learners - more than 20,000 learners are enrolled in the various courses.
- Within the framework of the MGF 45 partners have been selected as finalists and are currently in the eligibility checks for contracting. These projects would mobilise approx. 7.1 million €.
- 15 best practices on various topics have been shared and 12 dialogue events implemented in 2023.
- The foundation of an International Agribusiness Practitioners Association (IAPA) has been initiated which aims to manage ABF's training approaches in the future and advise on their implementation and adaptation.
